Previous work and volunteer experience in Weed Science: I grew up on a mixed farm in Saskatchewan, so weed experience came early for me. The weed that stands out the most is round-leaved mallow — we hosted a national event at the farm and that was one of the 'gifts' that someone left behind - it rapidly spread throughout our cattle pens. During my undergrad, I worked for a registrant on their research team and had my Master's program with AAFC in Saskatoon in weed biocontrol. I have been with the New Brunswick government for 15 years now, with an active research and extension program for producers.

For today, I'll go with marsh hedge-nettle (*Stachys palustris* L.). We had a very effective research collaboration with a local potato producer who was struggling with this weed. We all learned from each other and eventually found some effective management options. I also used this weed as one



of the 'months' in the Invasive Species Calendar that was made for the CWSS meeting in Victoria and eventually was a co-author on the Biology of Canadian Weeds account for this species.
