Message from the President David Clements

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As I reflect on my many and varied experiences at Canadian Weed Science Society meetings, my thoughts always go back to where it started for me. I had attended the ECW (Expert Committee on Weeds) meeting in Victoria in 1996, but that was not the real beginning – though I listened with interest to the discussion of “let’s go big or go home” there regarding the future of the organization. No – when it really started for me was four years later at the Banff meeting in 2000.

Even now, 12 years later, I treasure my memories from that meeting, and more than specific memories I remember a feeling that this was such a good place for me to be – as a

weed scientist connecting among my fellow Canadian weed scientists, learning and sharing the challenges and rewards of working with weeds. I usually tell people that the Banff meeting was such a great experience that I attended every meeting since, but in reviewing my history just now I realized that I did miss one – only one – Quebec City 2001. One of my most prominent

memories of that Banff meeting was of Denise Maurice, the local arrangements chair, making loud, boisterous and enthusiastic announcements. And so her passing last year was a great personal loss to me as it was to so many of you, but her spirit of enthusiasm continues to infest our society.

The question from 1996 of whether “to go big or go home” was answered with finality via the inaugural meeting of the reinvented organization in 2002 in Saskatoon (when we became the CWSS-SCM). Then ten years after the Victoria 1996 meeting where I felt like little more than a fly on the wall I found myself program chair for the Victoria 2006 meeting.

Following more than 30 years of service, Gary Turnbull, Senior Research Scientist within Crop Protection R&D Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, retired from Dow AgroSciences effective July 31st. Gary is currently responsible for leading the Canadian Seed Treatment R&D projects as well as all biology projects in Manitoba for characterization, development and technical support of crop protection products.

Gary joined the Elanco Company in 1981 after receiving advanced degrees from University of Guelph (MSc Weed Science) and a BSc degree in Plant Science from University of Manitoba. Gary held many significant technical leadership roles during his tenure including: Plant Science Rep positions in S. Ontario, Quebec, Maritimes, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan. He also served as Product Development Manager for Western Canada for several years. Post merger, he served as Research Scientist in Manitoba.

Among many contributions, key scientific and technical highlights of his career were introduction of Edge granular herbicide, serving as Product Development Manager for rapid adoption of Prevail, PB-50, Attain and Prestige, a sabbatical to Waikato, New Zealand to allow development of fungicide screening capability/capacity for W. Canada, providing technical support for pyroxasulfone, and his current role of leading canola seed treatment research in the prairies.

On Tuesday, July 24th, 2012, the University of Guelph- OAC Weeds' Team participated in the Northeast Weed Science Collegiate Contest hosted by Rutgers University located in the state of New Jersey. Three graduate and three undergraduate teams from OAC competed in the competition. The purpose of this contest is to provide students with an educational experience that tests their applied agronomic skills in the disciplines of crop protection and agronomy. A total of 63 students participated, representing 8 different schools. The OAC Weeds team was the only Canadian team. The universities represented were Pennsylvania State, Ohio State, Virginia Tech, North Carolina State, and the Univer-

sities of Tennessee, Cornell, Kentucky and Guelph.

This year the three University of Guelph undergraduate teams swept the awards, placing first, second and third. The first place team consisted of Adam Parker, Ryan Kennes, Dennis Cooper and Jenna MacDougall. Members of the team that placed second overall were, Chris Budd, Michael Russel and Duncan Ferguson. The third place team members were Lydia Harrison, Annemarie Van Wely, Emily den Haan and Joshua Burrows.

Individual undergraduate performance awards were given to Adam Parker, Ryan Kennes and Michael Russell who placed first, second and third respectively, in overall undergraduate performance. The remaining students from the undergraduate and graduate teams competed well and placed competitively within their categories.

Guelph undergraduate and graduate teams have participated in the Northeastern Weed Science Society's Collegiate Weed Science Contest since 1983. They have placed first in this regional competition 19 times. The OAC Weed Team was coached by Clarence Swanton and Darren Robinson. Our condolences

Clifford W. Crompton



Cliff Crompton died suddenly on Thursday, Oct. 25, 2012, in Quebec City. He was on his way home to Cape Breton after visiting family and friends in Ottawa. He survived by his wife, Alina Stahevitch; daughters, Karen (Bob) Rainboth and Valerie (John) MacKinnon; stepdaughter, Lara Russell and grandchildren, Owen, Emma, Madison and Paige.

Cliff Crompton was born in Antigonish, Nova Scotia, in 1941. He started working for Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada at an early age as a research technician, later running his own research program. His work on weeds and plant taxonomy will be well known to many as he was an active participant in the Expert Committee on Weeds. His work with I.J. Bassett lead to many papers and reports on aspects pollen including the two AAFC books: "An atlas of airborne pollen grains and common spores of Canada" and "Pollen grains of Canadian honey plants". The former has been an important reference for assessing aerial allergen loads and the later important for assessing the purity and nature of Canadian honey commodities (he and his book proved to be vital resources when European countries were looking at restricting Canadian honey imports due to pollen contamination). After retirement he set up a consulting company with others which, through a national system of monitoring stations, provided data on Canadian allergen loads for The Weather Channel and other parties. He was also involved in other types of environmental consulting in Nova Scotia.

As well as his palynology work, Cliff was an accomplished cytogeneticist and plant anatomist. He had broad interests and was always ready to seize interesting research opportunities. Outside the lab he was equally active in the community as church organist, choir master/member, and various social organizations.

Many long-time CWSS members will recall his enthusiastic participation in conversations while polishing the bar with his elbows. If experienced, his terrible jokes and hardy laugh are not to be forgotten.
